Her captivating performances have been featured in music videos of acclaimed artists such as Marika Hackman and Ebinum Brothers. A testament to her talent, Lea has lent her skills as a movement director to the award winning director Renee Maria Osubu for the short film "Dirt in the Diamonds" and Marika Hackman's music video "Yellos Mile", just to name a few. With CYCLE, Lea is bringing her vision as a dancer and movement director. This piece is the first episode of a series of dance films, which navigates around the themes of Womanhood and Spirituality. Lea is also developing her first short film, which talks about a relationship between siblings.

EN-PERFECCION pixelation

The company traces its roots - and motivations - back to the Ankoku-Butō movement active in Japan in the 1950s, mixing them with contemporary and experimental theater, resulting in performances with strong psychological/visual appeal: the performers' naked bodies, painted and covered with gold and mud, do not merely describe a state or an idea, but create a veritable chain of metamorphosis.

Domiziano Cristopharo (he/him)

Since 1990 he has perfectioned and expanded his technique studying "Psychology of form" with Nato Frasca' and by attending multiple courses and workshops, including Teatro Butoh, Solfeggio, Lyrical Vocal Technique, and Teatro Yoga with the likes of Memo Dini, Marcello Sambati, Simona Valli and Masaki Iwana. In the 1990s, together with actor/dancer Pino Grossi, he founded the Dance company CONTENITORI DI IMMAGINI with which he produced several shows for Italy and abroad. In 2002 he also create the music compilation TUTTI PAZZI PER RETTORE with which he obtains distribution at the European level, also reaching 12th place in the European chart. He founded BLOODY CABARET in 2006, a company of SIDESHOW and BODY ART with which he landed in 2007 to the most popular show in italy: DIGNITA' AUTONOME. He will then remain in this show as a solist until 2015, performing in historical theaters such as the Quirino (Rome) Franco Parenti (Milan), Bellini (Naples) and of which he will be spokesperson on RAI1 (the Italian National Television) together with actress Marianna Mercurio. In 2022 he was a guest of the University of Amsterdam on the themes of the staging of Gender and Violence.

Riy Mutakabbir (they/them/theirs)





In the Dance of Debate, We Find Strength in Solidarity. "SLUGFEST" emerges as a playful, engaging martial arts experience that delves into the "inner-feminist struggles" that have characterized recent years and decades. Yet, unlike narratives of division, this film champions the concept of unity, emphasizing the dire need for solidarity and deeper mutual respect within feminist discourse. The film's central motif is a stylized, choreographed sparring training that, while aimed at empowerment and self-discovery, can sometimes escalate beyond control. This metaphorical approach isn't about antagonism but represents the passionate debates that fuel progress and understanding, even when they momentarily seem to get out of hand. "There is no losing in martial arts. Either you win or you learn." - as Karate Kid would say today.





Their work as choreographers, educators, and interdisciplinary performers explore issues of identity and intergenerational relationality. Their work serves as a vibrant tapestry, weaving together the threads of queerness and Latinx heritage. As educators, they empower the next generation with tools for self-expression and resilience. Intergenerational relationality is a focal point of their work and they aim to bridge gaps and foster understanding between people of different backgrounds and experiences. These artists illuminate the diverse hues of their existence, celebrating queerness and Latinidad in a harmonious dance of cultural affirmation.




Blood Sister

It was during this time when lesbians-specifically in the medical field - stepped up to support their brethren. A new relationship was forging between the gay and lesbian community in a time when they needed to unite the most.

Lavina Rich (she/her)

Lavina Rich, choreographer and founder of Push Process Movement, is focused on exploring the human experience through movement. She studied dance at Grossmont College and then UCSD with many of San Diego's finest dance creators and educators. Since then, Lavina has performed with many local companies and international artists. Lavina had the privilege of dancing as an original member of bkSoul. Lavina has established herself as a patron and diverse contributor to the San Diego dance community. Lavina was one of the first recipients of the Emerging Artist program through the Arts District at Liberty Station- which gave her residency in Dance Place for eighteen months to create work. 





Alyah Baker (she/her)

Alyah Baker is a dance artist, scholar, and choreographer working at the intersection of art and embodied activism. She holds an MFA in Dance: Embodied Interdisciplinary Praxis, a B.A. in Sociology, and a minor in Dance from Duke University. In her work, Alyah examines power, the politics of place, and identity while centering liberation and joy. She is deeply committed to accessible arts education and building equitable creative ecosystems. Alyah has been recognized in local and national media, including Dance Teacher Magazine and the New York Times. American Dance Festival, Queering Dance Festival, Oakland Ballet, and others have commissioned Alyah's choreography. In 2021, Alyah founded AB Contemporary Dance, a project-based company exploring storytelling, queer aesthetics, and Black feminist praxis. The company's current project, Quare Dance, is a recipient of the 2023 - 24 National Performance Network Creation and Development Fund.

HOMBRES X

HOMBRES X, created by Melí Gómez and Annalise Carrillo Constantz works with dance, theater, and drag to channel messages from queer, trans, nonbinary, two-spirit, closeted ancestors whose stories were silenced. In this work, they examine the fluidity of gender from their own lived experiences growing up Xicanx. Both step into machismo and hyper femininity to analyze how it has permeated and bled into their culture, communities, and the limitless ways they have worn and shifted in, out and beyond the binaries.

annalise carrillo constantz (she/they) & melí gómez (they/them)

Melí Gómez & Annalise Carrillo Constantz are children and grandchildren of immigrants and farmworkers. They dance together to connect to themselves, each other, their ancestors, and the land. They dance to make sense of it all. Meli Gómez (they/them) is a first generation queer artist. They attended UCSC, earning a BA in Theater Arts, minor in dance. They've been involved in multiple projects locally through acting, film, and dance. They have performed in works with GERALDCASELDANCE, Chloe Rosen, and were part of the first annual Black and Brown Queer Dance Festival. Today they continue weaving their intersecting identities into their movement work. Their primary focus through their work is navigating movement amidst the waves of chronic pain, processing and feeling. Annalise Carrillo Constantz (she/they) is dance/performance artist who grew up beneath the oak trees on Ramaytush Ohlone land. She's queer, she's Mexican, and she's kinda crunchy. She has performed in works with GERALDCASELDANCE, Alex Law, and REYESdance, amongst others. Sam Arrow (They/Them/Theirs) is a dance artist creating work that feels both personal and universal. Their art centers on family needs within ableist, heteronormative, oppressive structures. They are a micro activist who draws on their life as a parent and partner, and knowledge about the human body to empower those around them. They trained in dance, including ballet, modern and jazz from the age of 8 and graduated with a BFA in Dance from the University of Arizona and then earned a Doctorate in Physical therapy from the AZ School of Health Sciences. They are a Permanent Artist in Residence with [nueBOX] and business owner of Arrow Physical Therapy, which specializes in pelvic floor health.




This4ya&You4ya
